ABOUT THE VOLTI CHORAL INSTITUTE

Volti's Choral Institute for High School Singers is a musically-intensive, content-rich weekend that engages high school choirs with young professional singers. Now in its 15th season, the Choral Institute offers two sessions: one in September or October for mixed choirs, and one in January or February, usually for treble voice choirs.

The goals of the Choral Institute are to use the precious rehearsal time at the Institute weekend to develop music that will be useful for the choirs back home. Members of Volti act as section leaders in the music the group is learning as a whole; lead sectional rehearsals; give voice lessons and master classes; assist the high school conductors in teaching each choir's repertoire; and sit side by side with the high school singers in mass group rehearsals. In these ways the Volti singers can lead by example as well as give some private voice instruction to individuals who may not have access to it at home. A highlight of the weekend is the Saturday evening concert when each choir performs for the others, with evaluation and constructive criticism from the Volti singers.

This year, for the first time, the participating choirs commissioned a piece of music. We have had composers-in-residence before -- Morten Lauridsen, Kirke Mechem and Stacy Garrop -- but we have never before commissioned a composer to write a piece specifically for the Choral Institute. Working with the composer and poet on the birth of a new piece of music is an incredibly powerful and enriching experience for the Choral Institute singers. You will hear the world premiere tonight of Eric Tuan's Darkness and Slight Light, and you will hear the poem read by its author, Caitlin Hernandez.

Students who complete the Choral Institute are entitled to complimentary tickets to Volti concerts, and they are invited to join the San Francisco Choral Society with a tuition waiver and complimentary scores for their summer concert.

Educating, developing, and mentoring the singers of tomorrow is one of the most important things we can do. Volti San Francisco, California

Volti's twenty professional singers, under the direction of founder and Artistic Director Robert Geary, are dedicated to the discovery, creation, and performance of new vocal music. The ensemble's mission is to foster and showcase contemporary American music and composers, and to introduce contemporary vocal music from around the world to local audiences. The group has commissioned nearly 100 new works, by emerging as well as established composers.

Robert Geary, founding Artistic Director of the professional ensemble Volti, the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir, and the Golden Gate International Choral Festival, also serves as Artistic Director of the San Francisco Choral Society. Geary's dedication to today's choral music has fostered the careers of several leading composers and has led to nearly 200 new works and a total of nine ASCAP awards for Adventurous Programming. His choirs have won numerous awards at prestigious competitions in Asia, Europe, Russia, and North America. Geary has conducted in 26 countries and recorded for Koch International, Swiss International Radio and Innova. He has prepared choirs for some of the world's leading conductors and has served as a clinician and guest conductor in the US, Finland, Denmark, and Singapore.

The Blue Of Distance (Tolumos mėlynumas) (2010)

Composer's Note:

When searching for the lyrics for my choral piece, I encountered an alluring phrase "the blue of distance." It remained just a poetical-philosophical hint since the text itself doesn't get utilized at all. Instead, the function of the lyrics is given to a set of speech sounds – mostly humming or the sung open vowels "a-e-i-o-u." In one part of the piece these vowels-letters appear as chords, they determine the succession of entrances of choral voices and their interrelationships.

The Blue of Distance (from Rebecca Solnit "A Field Guide to Getting Lost")

"The world is blue at its edges and in its depths... that color of horizons, of remote mountain ranges, of anything far away. The color of that distance is the color of an emotion, the color of solitude and of desire, the color of there seen from here, the color of where you are not. And the color of where you can never go. For the blue is not in the place those miles away at the horizon, but in the atmospheric distance between you and the mountains... Blue is the color of longing for the distances you never arrive in, for the blue world..."

Concert Choir and Chamber Singers Acalanes High School Lafayette, California

The Acalanes High School Concert Choir is the intermediate level ensemble in the choral program at Acalanes. They perform at all home concerts, participate in Choral Institute, sing at CMEA Choral Festivals, and a majority of their members are involved in the annual Spring Musical production.

The Acalanes High School Chamber Singers is the top auditioned mixed ensemble at Acalanes High School. This ensemble is one of two advanced ensembles in the choral program. Chamber Singers performs literature of all musical periods and frequently have in repertoire music that is considered to be at a college level. They have competed and performed in England, Switzerland, France, Chicago, New York, Seattle, and Los Angeles.

Bruce Lengacher received his Bachelor of Music Education and a Master of Arts in Education from San Francisco State University. He is in his seventeenth year as the director of choral activities at Acalanes High School in Lafayette where he also serves as the chairperson of the Visual and Performing Arts Department. Bruce has served as the General / Classroom Music and the Choral Representative for the Bay Section of the California Music Educators Association and is presently the CMEA Bay Section Choral Representative. He is a member of the American Choral Directors Association and the National Association for Music Education. Bruce has worked with Ragazzi Boys Chorus, the Peninsula Girls Chorus, Chanticleer and Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir. In 2010 he received the Rose Award from Acalanes as the Teacher of the Year, and received the Choral Music Educator of the Year from CMEA Bay Section in 2015. He is a composer/arranger, a clinician, and a founding member of the Choral Project. He lives in El Cerrito with his wife, Leslie.

Colla Voce The Head-Royce School Oakland, California

The Head-Royce School is an independent, non-denominational, college preparatory school located in the wooded hills of Oakland, California, overlooking the San Francisco Bay. The K-12 school offers a challenging coeducational program in which the arts are strongly valued as an important component in the development of the whole child. Colla Voce has consistently received superior ratings at California Music Educator's Association choral festivals and gold awards at the Heritage Festivals. The ensemble tours annually and has also toured abroad to England in 2003, the Czech Republic in 2006 and South Africa in 2012.

Robert Wells, director of vocal music at Head-Royce, received his Bachelor of Arts in vocal performance from the New England Conservatory in Boston and his Master of Arts in choral conducting and vocal performance from San Jose State University. Mr. Wells was a conductor for the Piedmont Children's Choirs for ten years prior to his arrival at Head-Royce. He currently conducts three choirs and is enjoying his twenty-third year as the vocal music director at Head-Royce.

Dido and Aeneas, Opera in Three Acts

Henry Purcell (1659-1695)

Henry Purcell was one of England's greatest composers. Purcell's output of dramatic music was all incidental music written for plays, with the exception of *Dido and Aeneas*, considered to be one of the first complete English operas ever composed. The tragic opera in three acts was written for the Josias Priest's School for Young Gentlewomen in Chelsea. Nahum Tate, a contemporary of Purcell's, wrote the libretto and adapted the story from Virgil's *Aeneid*.

Colla Voce will perform the full opera for the student body at Head-Royce later this semester. Tonight, Colla Voce will sing concertized and abbreviated selections from Act 1, including several choruses, arias and recitatives.

The story:

Surrounded by her attendants in her court, Dido, Queen of Carthage, is inconsolable, still mourning the death of her husband some time ago. Her sister and handmaiden, Belinda, tries desperately to cheer her up, but Dido is depressed, saying that she and peace are nothing more than strangers now. Belinda suggests to Dido that finding love will cure her grief. Belinda wants Dido to marry Aeneas, a Trojan hero who escaped Troy after it fell to the Greeks, who has asked permission to rest his men for a while in Carthage. Dido fears that falling in love will make her a weak ruler, but Belinda points out that even great heroes find love. When Aeneas enters Dido's court, Dido still has reservations and greets him coldly. Finally, her heart warms up to the idea and she answers his marriage proposal with a yes. At the end of Act 1, the Sorceress and several other witches appear. They put a curse on the relationship between Dido and Aeneas, thus setting the stage for the next two acts of this tragic opera.

142 Throckmorton is the address of the historic Throckmorton Theatre in Mill Valley, home to iconic comedians (i.e. Dana Carvey, Mark Pitta, Mort Sahl, Robin Williams), and produces first class music (i.e. Left Coast Ensemble), art shows, live theater, and choral music for adults and teens. The group of auditioned high-school aged singers (also known as Throckappella) is in its 5th year and just beginning year two under the direction of Sue Bohlin. They meet on Wednesday night for 90 minutes, study theory and a variety of music, and attended the Choral Institute for the first time this year. www.throckmortontheatre.org .

Sue Bohlin has performed music on stages all over the world and has worked with numerous arts organizations including symphonies and opera companies, children's and adult choruses, school and church choirs, instrumental ensembles, theaters and dance groups. In addition to the Throckmorton Choir, Sue also works as Associate Conductor and Accompanist for the Piedmont East Bay Children's choir, and has been Volti's main rehearsal pianist for many years. A former oboist and experimental theater music director, Sue composes and arranges for choirs she has been associated with. She is published with Santa Barbara Music and Alliance Music. A graduate of the Conservatory at University of the Pacific, Sue lives with colleague and husband Robert Geary in Sausalito.

Ecco Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir Oakland, California

Since 1982, the award-winning Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir has offered exceptional music and choral training to hundreds of boys and girls from schools throughout the San Francisco East Bay Area. Under the leadership of founder and artistic director Robert Geary, PEBCC seeks to advance the choral arts through education, performance, and collaboration at the highest artistic level, fostering individual development and international relationships. **Ecco**, the high-school mixed ensemble of PEBCC, rehearses once weekly and prepares students for the transition to choral music-making at the collegiate level. Drawing on the culminated talents of maturing PEBCC students, Ecco presents a variety of challenging choral literature, ranging from Renaissance polyphony to vocal jazz to newly commissioned works.

Ecco director **Eric Tuan** enjoys a varied career as conductor, singer, collaborative pianist, and composer in the San Francisco Bay Area. In addition to his work with Ecco, he serves as director of music at Christ Church Los Altos and as the founding director of the chamber choir Convivium. Eric has sung professionally with Volti, Cappella SF, and the Philharmonia Baroque Chorale, and has worked as a staff accompanist for Stanford's music department. His choral music has been performed by leading Bay Area choral ensembles and is published by E.C. Schirmer. Eric received his undergraduate degree from Stanford University, and recently completed a Master of Music in Choral Studies at the University of Cambridge with the support of a Gates Cambridge Scholarship.

Two Estonian Lullabies (1989)

Veljo Tormis (b. 1930)

Perhaps Estonia's most famous living composer, Veljo Tormis has gained worldwide recognition for his mesmerizing settings of Finno-Ugric folk melodies. Rather than "developing" the melodies through variation and counterpoint, Tormis allows the hypnotic repetition of the melody to dominate his arrangements; as he has often stated, "I don't use folksong; folksong uses me."

We then present *Daemon Irrepit Callidus* by Hungarian composer György Orbán, who has served as professor of composition at the Liszt Academy of Music in Budapest. Orbán sets a poem by a 17th-century monk that warns of the many temptations of the devil, underlaying the text with a playful and challenging choral setting.

Stacy Garrop (b. 1969) received a 2012 commission from the Fromm Music Foundation at Harvard University, awards from the Detroit Symphony Orchestra, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, Omaha Symphony, New England Philharmonic, Pittsburgh New Music Ensemble, and the Sackler Composition Prize, as well as two Barlow Endowment commissions. The San Francisco Choral Society recently commissioned and premiered her oratorio *Terra Nostra*. Songs of Lowly Life (2011)

Composer's Note:

When Volti commissioned me for a new choral piece, I seized the opportunity to feature the poems of Paul Laurence Dunbar. Dunbar was the first African-American poet and novelist to gain national and international recognition. Born in Dayton, Ohio, in 1872, his mother was a former slave and his father had escaped from slavery prior to serving in the 55th Massachusetts Infantry Regiment and the 5th Massachusetts Colored Cavalry Regiment during the Civil War. Dunbar began writing poetry as a child and published his first book of poems, called *Oak and Ivy*, when he was twenty. This was followed by eleven additional books of poetry, four books of short stories, five novels, and a play. The subject matter of Dunbar's poems encompasses a wide array of topics, from his observations of nature, love, and life to his renditions (many of which are written in dialect) of African American life. Dunbar's life was ultimately cut short when he contracted tuberculosis and died at the age of 33 in 1906. The title for my song cycle is taken from Dunbar's 1896 book *Lyrics of Lowly Life*, from which several of these texts were drawn.

When not immersed in study, the department is dedicated to musical outreach in middle schools during this desperate time for arts education in public schools. We thank you for the opportunity to perform for you!

Texas native **Kristen Grzeca** is thrilled to step into a new role this year as Director of Vocal Music at SOTA, where she has taught and conducted as an Artist in Residence for six years. A dedicated music educator, Kristen has taught at San Francisco Conservatory of Music, San Francisco State University, and UC Berkeley. Kristen also maintains a diverse and accomplished private studio in San Francisco and Oakland. Kristen holds degrees from SFCM (M.M. - Voice Performance & Opera Studies) and UC Berkeley (M.A. - Music History & Literature), where she specialized in the musicological and performative intersections of voice, opera, gender studies, and media.

Darkness and Slight Light was commissioned for Volti's September 2015 Choral Institute for High School Singers. Participating choirs include the Concert Choir and Chamber Singers from the Ruth Asawa San Francisco School of the Arts (Kristen Grzeca, director), Colla Voce from the Head Royce School (Robert Wells, director), Ecco from the Piedmont East Bay Children's Choir (Eric Tuan, director), the Chamber Singers from Acalanes High School (Bruce Lengacher, director), and Volti (Robert Geary, director).

From the composer

When I was asked to compose a massed piece for Volti's 2015 Choral Institute, I knew it would be an ideal opportunity to collaborate with Bay Area writer Caitlin Hernandez. Caitlin, who is blind, has been a close friend since high school. Her writing – which spans both words and music – includes musicals and theater pieces that have been performed by CRE Outreach, the only all-blind theater troupe in the United States. Her short stories, poetry, and nonfiction pieces have also been published online and in various anthologies. One of Caitlin's passions is writing for young adults, and I knew that her words would have a special resonance for the high school singers at Choral Institute.

Caitlin's probing discussion of blindness and sight brings up questions about who we are and how we form our own identity. I have sought to counterpoint Caitlin's poetry with a musical language that draws on different facets of my own experience. The first movement references elements of my Japanese-American heritage, especially the ethereal harmonies of the shō (mouth organ); the second is reminiscent of the Anglican choral tradition I was immersed in while studying in England this past year; and the third reflects the lush sonorities of contemporary American choral music. I hope the piece encourages you also to reflect on your identity and ask, "Would I be the same?"

From the poet

As a person who has been totally blind since birth, I am often asked what blindness is like, what I most wish I could see, and if, given the opportunity, I would choose to have vision. There are no simple answers to these questions; if anything, my responses have become more varied and complicated over the years. What I do believe—and what I tried to capture in this poem—is that, though blindness is certainly isolating and frustrating at times, it also shapes my life in many uniquely beautiful ways. Every blind person's experience is different; no two blind people navigate the sighted world in the same way. For me, blindness is most manageable when sighted friends strive to truly understand it: when they find the empathy, courage, and time to meet me halfway between their vision and mine and build a bridge.

Sunrise, clouds, and things I can't see, What sky looks like while I'm riding a swing, Whether the breeze has silvery wings, I'd love to know, Just to know.
